## Neighbourhood Planning

### Planning for the Next Generation

#### Botley Neighbourhood Plan

Earlier this year the Parish Council decided to undertake the preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan for Botley.

#### What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

The Localism Act 2011 introduced a new form of planning policy, Neighbourhood Plans. These offer communities a right to shape development by deciding where new houses, businesses and shops should go and what they should look like. Although unique to each community a Neighbourhood Plan must also follow the guidance of national planning policy. Once adopted they become part of the Local Plan policy documents used in the determination of planning applications. However it must also be noted that a Neighbourhood Plan cannot block or stop development which is already part of a Local Plan but what it can do is to influence the type of development and where it goes.

#### What does the preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan involve?

A Plan is put together after locally focused consultation on local issues. It offers an opportunity to have a say in how the parish develops over the next 15 to 20 years.

#### What can you do?

Everyone can contribute to the Plan by commenting on the proposals as they are put together. By voting when the Neighbourhood Plan goes to a local referendum the support of a majority “yes” vote will mean the Plan can be formally adopted as a Planning Policy document specific to Botley.

During the Autumn the Council will set up a Steering Committee of councillors and local volunteers to lead a community wide consultation. Formal and informal meetings will be held, and surveys circulated, to collect ideas, comments and opinions from all sections of the community. To help with this process as a volunteer please contact the Parish Council.

The remaining saplings were planted at Moorgreen Recreation Ground, West End, by West End Brownies and members of the Youth Club.

Members of the Hedge End Breakfast Rotary Club, their spouses and friends attended both events and a minute's silence was observed at both venues to remember all those who perished in the Great War.

## *Bridge over crumbled mortar? Not any more!*

Take a walk down Lovers Lane and you'll notice that the bridge over Pudbrook stream has had a facelift. The damaged footway has been replaced with Duraplas "recycled plastic wood" planks, similar to those used in other restored sections of boardwalk by the stream.

This material is extremely durable, rot proof and requires little or no maintenance as well as having a slip resistant finish, ensuring good grip in all weather. Finally the railings were being repainted to complete the transformation.

### ‘We’re Watching You’: Campaign Update

The anti-fouling campaign was featured on the front of the Spring Newsletter and carried out under the guidelines suggested by Keep Britain Tidy.

Key problem areas of the High Street Recreation Ground were identified. These were walked and monitored, any dog poo seen was bagged, counted and recorded; other areas were also monitored to give an idea of the scale of the problem elsewhere.

Analysing the data for these areas during the 9 weeks the campaign showed that there had been approximately 35% decrease in fouling incidents. This is an excellent positive result and in line with Keep Britain Tidy’s expectations for the programme. Another benefit of the project is that the Council now has a much more comprehensive picture of the issue for the entire Recreation Ground and various measures have been put in place to help maintain the improvement.

The Parish Council will continue to keep the issue of dog fouling under review and will employ updated initiatives as necessary.

### Two New Business Grant Schemes from Eastleigh Borough Council

**Business Start-Up Grant:** intended to help set up a new business. It is a one off payment of up to £250 towards a new business that is registered and trading in the Borough of Eastleigh, employs 10 or less people and has been trading for less than 12 months.

**Incentive to Grow Grant:** focussed on assisting companies to expand. The expansion could be through training, marketing, buying of equipment, moving into business premises or taking on staff. The grant will fund 50% of the project up to the value of £500. The grant is available to businesses in the Borough with 10 or less employees that have been trading for over 12 months.

## THE BOTLEY AND CURDRIDGE WELFARE TRUST

Some readers may have heard of the Botley and Curdridge Welfare Trust but many will be unaware of its function, or history.

The Trust originated as the 'Botley and Curdridge Nurses Home', housed at 'Leehurst' which is in Botley High Street, near the school crossing. The Trust started long before the inception of the NHS and Nurses Homes were commonplace in rural areas.

In 1921 it was realised that future provision of a nursing service in Botley and Curdridge would almost certainly fall to the Nurses Home to provide and so the Botley War Relief Fund donated the balance of their fund to the Trustees of the Nurses Home. The agreement was that £10 per annum would be paid towards the salary of the nurse and the Botley and Curdridge Nursing Association eventually materialised.

In 1923 the Nursing Association received very generous donations from the estate of Mr RT Green and from Augusta Burrell, who lived at Fairthorne Manor. By 1924

the Trustees were Dr Alfred Pern, Albert Woodrow, George Truckle, Rev Salwey, John Luxton, Charles Randolph, Mrs Melville Pern and Miss Edith Jenkyns.

Modernisation of the house took place during 1935/6 including the installation of a bath and wc, and the provision of a cesspool (it was specified that the Trustees be responsible for its emptying.) In 1937 the Trustees entered into an agreement with Hampshire County Council to provide a midwifery and maternity service. 1953 saw a complete refurbishment of Leehurst, which was by now very dilapidated but it was not until 1961 that the house was connected to the sewerage system and the cesspool filled in! Finally in 1969 the house was sold to a private buyer for a net profit of £3,707.17.0d.

Little is known of the activities of the Nurses Home charity until 1994 when the Botley and Curdridge Nurses Home officially changed its name to the Botley and Curdridge Welfare Trust. The first Trustees

were Jeanette Collett, representing Botley Parish Council and Doreen Manship representing Curdridge Parish Council. The first co-opted Trustees were Arnold Dean, Margaret Freeman, John Lawson, Bernard Dibley and Violet Puddle.

Unlike many small historic charities the Trust remains active, providing hampers at Christmas for long standing residents, donations to the village mini bus funds and giving assistance when required to those in need from Botley and Curdridge.

Help is given in many ways, for example helping with the cost of uniform for a school child whose family were in temporary difficulties and the provision of a key box for an elderly resident.

# BOTLEY CURDRIDGE AND DURLEY HISTORY SOCIETY

## VILLAGE HISTORY - PART 49 -

### VILLAGE INFRASTRUCTURE

When I moved to Botley with my family in October 1962, villagers' concerns centred on the lack of public toilets; difficult and haphazard traffic parked in the village square; increasing traffic through the village and a need for a by-pass. Fifty-three years later, have these problems been resolved? I was reminded of these issues by a scrapbook of local press cuttings, collated by Ralph Deacon, covering the past 50 years of Botley history.

As early as 1957 the Parish Council sought a site for a Public Convenience in the village centre and during the next 15 years many locations were considered: Next to the Fire Station (then in the High Street); land by Four Acre; land adjoining Maffey's garage in Church Lane; next to the Brewery Bar; land by the Forge (High Street) and the rear of the Market Hall. Finally in 1972 the Parish Council requested that the Borough Council (then the Winchester Rural District Council) utilise some of their land, partly used as allotments in Mortimer Road, to construct a car park and Public Convenience. The toilets were eventually built in 1975.

Two years later, the toilets were closed due to vandalism and fire and the Council instructed that they were to be closed at night. In January 1999 there was a further threat to closure due to a Borough Council funding cut. One section of the toilets was permanently closed in 2002 due to criminal activities.

In 2007, the Parish Council proposed a building containing a parish office, information centre and public toilet to be built on the site. But the project was

dropped due to lack of funding.

A year later, the Parish and Borough Councils and the Football Foundation funded an extension and refurbishment of the Botley Centre sports changing rooms. This building included toilets for public use and the Mortimer Road toilets were finally closed.

As car ownership increased in the 1960s and 70s Botley Square became congested with haphazardly parked vehicles. In 1975, it was proposed that the centre of Botley should become a conservation area and the appearance of the Square became important to this aim. Thus a site for a village car park was sought by the Parish and Borough Councils. The car park next to the public toilets in Mortimer Road was too distant from the Square to alleviate the congestion.

In 1988 the Borough Council proposed 12 parking spaces with a waiting limit of one hour but village traders were outraged, complaining they would go out of business. One said 'If you want ye olde Botley with ye olde craft shops and ye olde bench seat, you won't have any olde traders left.'

Finally a lease was agreed with the brewers who own the Dolphin Hotel, for use of land behind the hotel as the village car park. A 50-space car park costing £90,000 was opened by the Mayor of Eastleigh in 1989.

A redevelopment of the Square was finally undertaken in 1990, with spaces for 21 cars, lay-by for buses, introduction of bollards and seats and the repositioning of the Cobbett memorial (its original site was by the bridge opposite the Mill).

A route for a Botley by-pass was considered as early as 1974 when land was safeguarded in Eastleigh Borough Council's Local Plan for a relief road from the Maypole roundabout to a point near Botley railway station.

The following years brought hopes and disappointments. In February 1985, the

Government warned that there would be no by-pass before the year 2000. A year later the Ministry of Transport and Hampshire County Council agreed that a road was necessary, despite the supposed benefits of the M27. In 1987 local MP Sir David Price supported the by-pass at an estimated cost of £1.5M but with little hope of it becoming a reality in the near future.

As traffic has increased so the need for a by-pass has become ever more urgent. In the 40 years since the route was identified, the volume of traffic through the village has increased dramatically, causing an unacceptable level of air and noise pollution and potential damage to the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> century housing that characterises the village centre. Recent huge developments planned around the village do not include plans for a by-pass. Despite promises from successive governments and County Councils, the by-pass remains the outstanding need to make Botley, as Cobbett observed in 1805, *'the most delightful village in the world'*
